

Regional travel

Several countries in the region have implemented enhanced surveillance for the COVID-19 infections at their ports of entry and issued travel advisories and restrictions as detailed below:

Cook Islands	As of 17 March 2020 <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Anyone intending to enter Rarotonga from any country with the exception of New Zealand is required to self-quarantine for 14 days in New Zealand. This includes Cook Islanders returning from countries other than New Zealand. Fiji	<p>As of 19 March 2020</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Border restrictions on mainland China, Italy, Iran, Spain and South Korea will be extended to foreign nationals who have been present in the United States of America and all of Europe, including the United Kingdom, within 14 days of their intended travel to Fiji. • Anyone entering Fiji from any overseas destination will be required to self-quarantine for 14 days, meaning they must stay in one place and avoid contact with others or going out in public as much as possible. 		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Fijians are strongly advised to avoid any non-essential travel to Italy, Iran, mainland China or South Korea. • Fijians may be required to self-isolate for 14 days upon return to Fiji from nations on the restricted travel list. • Ministers, civil servants, Permanent Secretaries and staff of statutory bodies will be restricted from travelling overseas barring exceptionally critical circumstances
French Polynesia	<p>As of 17 March 2020</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The government of French Polynesia has taken the decision, in full agreement with the State services, to impose on any passenger from an international flight a measure of self-containment at home or at any accommodation located on the island of Tahiti. Travel to the islands will only be allowed after the strict 14-day containment period. More information. 		
Guam	<p>As of 18 March 2020</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Non-residents seeking entry into Guam traveling from areas affected by COVID-19 other than the Philippines will be subject to mandatory quarantine. The mandatory quarantine will be applied unless the traveler possesses a healthcare recognized and certified document that attests he or she is not infected with COVID-19 within the last 72 hours. • DPHSS is requiring all travelers to secure a COVID-19 test within 72 hours PRIOR to arrival on Guam and present negative results for entry into Guam. Any and all travelers arriving without these credentials will be subject to mandatory quarantine. 		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Returning residents without the same certification will be subject to quarantine in their homes for a minimum of 14 days. As this is an evolving process, these guidelines are subject to revision.
Hawaii		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Anyone arriving in Hawaii after having traveled to areas with widespread sustained community transmission are being asked to stay home and monitor their health for 14 days from the time they left the affected area. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The Hawaii Department of Health (HDOH) is urging all residents to avoid travel to areas with a high burden of the disease and reconsider any travel if you are elderly or have underlying medical conditions.

New Zealand	<p>As of March 19 2020</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> From 11.59pm 19 March 2020, only New Zealand residents and citizens (and their children and partners) will be permitted to enter New Zealand. 		
Palau		<p>As of February 24, 2020:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> All flights and passenger vessels from mainland China, Hong Kong, and Macau to Palau are temporarily suspended. Foreign travelers from these areas are also temporarily banned from entry into Palau until March 31, 2020. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> All travelers to avoid non-essential travel to mainland China, Hong Kong, Macau, Japan and South Korea.

All aircraft that need to land in the RMI for refuelling purposes must adhere to the RMI Ports Authority Standard Operating Procedures (SOP). Samoa	<p>As of 18 March</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> All Travelers originating FROM or TRANSITING through; CHINA, HONG KONG, MACAU, JAPAN, SINGAPORE, THAILAND, SOUTH KOREA, ITALY, IRAN, KUWAIT, TAIWAN, GERMANY, SPAIN, FRANCE, SAUDI ARABIA, AUSTRIA, BELGIUM, CANADA, MALAYSIA, DENMARK, CZECHIA REP, GREECE, ICELAND, LUXEMBOURG, NETHERLANDS, NORWAY, QATAR, SWEDEN, SWITZERLAND, UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, UNITED ARAB EMIRATES, UNITED KINGDOM, AUSTRALIA, must spend at least 14 days self-quarantine at country of last port and MUST have a Medical Clearance within (3) days prior to final route to Samoa. ALL medical clearance for ALL Passengers entering Samoa must include proof of test results done within 5 days for the Coronavirus (COVID-2019). Tonga	<p>As of 17 March 2020</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> All international travellers, originating from or transiting through countries listed in Annex 1 shall: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> -spend at least 14 days self-quarantine outside of the countries listed in Annex 1. Vanuatu	<p>As of 18 March 2020</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Any travellers wishing to enter Vanuatu who has originated from the following places: mainland China, Taiwan, Hong Kong SAR and Macao SAR, South Korea, Japan, Singapore, Iran, Italy, Spain, France, Germany, Switzerland, Netherlands, United Kingdom, Denmark, Sweden, Norway, Belgium, Austria, Czech Republic, Slovenia, Portugal, Finland, Israel, Australia, New Caledonia, Malaysia, Qatar, Kuwait, Bahrain, Canada and United States of America in the last 14 days will be denied entry to Vanuatu until 		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Permanent Residents and citizens of Vanuatu are advised to reconsider travelling overseas as of 17th March 2020 including a total restriction to travel to or transit in any of the listed countries.
